

Chapel Hill Monthly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business

June 15, 2008 Minutes Marsha Green, Acting Clerk Susan Inglis, Recording Clerk

Query: How well do we apply the testimony of simplicity to our individual lives, to the responsible use and the distribution of natural resources, and to the protection of the planet from the ravages of exploitation and pollution? Do we have reverent respect for all forms of life on the earth we share?

- 1. The Clerk welcomed Friends, and reviewed the agenda. There were no First-Time Attenders
- 2. The Clerk reviewed the Minutes for May Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business. Candice Kern requested that the sentence on page10 be corrected to read "The Library Committee is reorganizing the Library space."
- 3. The agenda item to request the approval of Lauren Hart as new First Day School Coordinator was held over, as there was no one from Children's Religious Education Committee present to bring the request. Friends note their thanks to Lauren for acting as interim First Day School Coordinator until we complete the process of approving her for this paid position.
- 4. Nominations Committee Recommendations for Committee Membership for 2008-2009 –

Faye Stanley presented the roster for committee service for 2008-2009 [attached]. She commented that there had been a request that we add to the roster the trustees of the meeting, and the meeting treasurer. Faye explained that this has not been part of what Nominations has worked on deciding, so is not part of what is being brought for approval now. Since there was some confusion as to the role of Nominations Committee in this area, the meeting asked the Nominations Committee to meet with the clerk to clarify the duties of the Nominations Committee. The Nominations Committee hopes to be able to report back on this when they give their annual report.

In presenting the roster for approval, Faye noted that PFF needs more people. For clarity, Faye noted that the clerks & youth liaisons of each committee are chosen by the committees themselves, and that information is provided to publications for the directory.

Robin Harper raised the question of when the directory should be published, whether the meeting is more concerned about completeness or speed. Upon considering whether we prefer that the directory be published immediately, or wait until 1) the committee clerks have been chosen and 2) the elections have been held so that we have correct contact info for our elected officials, Friends decided to:

- Get a directory out as soon as possible, with the new committees for 2008-09 listed
- Add a sheet with elected officials later
- Publish the list of committee clerks in each newsletter
 that decided. Friends approved the rester of committee may

With that decided, Friends approved the roster of committee members as presented, with thanks for the Nominations Committee's diligent work.

5. Treasurer's Report – Judy Purvis presented the treasurer's report for the Finance Committee.

Judy answered several questions about our rather lean financial position. Ken Grogan, a member of the Finance Committee, took the opportunity to note that the Finance Committee expects to do a fundraising campaign to meet the budget, as it is not expected that business-as-usual will meet the proposed budget. Friends accepted the report with thanks to Judy for her efforts.

6. Finance Committee Recommendations for 2008-2009 Budget – Judy presented the recommended budget (attached), with a request for approval.

After answering several questions, Judy clarified that the finance committee is recommending this budget and is committing themselves to helping the community meet the budget. To do so, the committee will be reaching out to the meeting to discuss with members and attenders how we sustain this community. At this point, our regularly monthly donation income is far less than our monthly obligations. We get donations from a small proportion of our

members and attenders, and many who donate do so once a year in a lump sum. The committee encourages Friends to give as generously as possible, and to make donations regularly. Judy also encourages Friends to report as gifts-in-kind the costs that they absorb personally, as this will help the Finance Committee know what each committee actually needs. Friends noted the challenge of sustaining ourselves as a community, financially and otherwise, particularly in response to the idea of doing development work among members. The matter of cultivating and allocating resources is a sensitive one. Friends are encouraged to look around the meeting and see what we do. Our donations sustain us and other organizations as an extension of ourselves in the world.

Committee clerks who have responsibilities for overseeing specific benevolences are asked to determine when certain amounts should be paid. This will help the finance committee spread out payments in a way that serves the recipients as well as the meeting.

Friends approved the budget with an acknowledgement that we need to increase our giving to the meeting. Friends also approved minuting our concern that the conversation about the level of our benevolences as a proportion of our budget, as well as the question of what organizations we give to, be an active conversation throughout the year, rather than having the conversation only at the time of the budget.

- 7. Request to Approve to Social Action Grants Hank Elkins for Peace & Social Concerns Committee presented requests for two grants from the Social Action Grants Fund. In sum, these are less than the committee had budgeted for this year, and they do not expect to request more this year. The first request was for a \$1,000 a grant to the Community Success Initiative for two employment workshops to be held with employers, ex-offenders, community volunteers and others. The second was for \$500 for supporting the work of Russell Herman, an independent consultant for non-profits. Friends approved both grants (both attached).
- 8. Library Committee Annual Report was held over to next meeting.



Descriptions of Benevolences Recommended by The Peace and Social Concerns Committee

Hank Elkins presented a list of benevolences that are recommended by the Peace and Social Concerns Committee. Three basic guidelines for these benevolences were that they are Quaker administered, involve members, and are preferably local. They also reflect the leading of the Committee to increase our commitment to global stewardship. The benevolences are briefly listed below:

Alamance/Orange Prison Ministry funds a full time Chaplain at the Orange Correctional Center, serves incarcerated prisoners, and works with outside groups for the transition of prisoners to civilian life.

American Friends Service Committee (AFSC) works to understand and address the root causes of poverty, injustice, and war.

Bolivian Quaker Education Fund (BQEF) works with Bolivian Quakers, a large population, many of whom are impoverished, to fund scholarships in public universities for Quaker students, English and computer education in Quaker schools, and a health and dental education and service program for students and their parents in Quaker schools.

Carolina Friends School (CFS). The May, 2007 Meeting for Business agreed to increase our commitment to CFS, but given our concerns about the size of the overall Meeting budget and our desire to maintain a good balance in the benevolence budget, we propose returning to the lesser financial commitment.

Friends Committee on Legislation (FCNL) lobbies in Washington for Quaker concerns and alerts Friends for strategic messages to their legislators.

Habitat for Humanity (Orange County) brings together people and resources to help families in need build and own quality affordable homes.

Interfaith Council for Social Service provides shelter, food, direct services, advocacy and information to people in need.

NC Council of Churches (NCCC) unites members of 15 denominations in statewide policy action. "From efforts on behalf of farm workers, to encouraging the protection of God's earth, to exposing racism within the criminal justice system, the North Carolina Council of Churches is at the forefront of progressive social issues."

NC Warn combines science, activism and research to organize for a safe, sustainable energy future in North Carolina. NC Warn's mission includes: 1) Stopping new coal and nuclear power plants 2) Emphasizing energy efficiency and renewables, and 3) Watch-dogging nuclear power plants in the Carolinas, with particular attention to Progress Energy's Shearon Harris plant. NC Warn has recently created a green jobs program.

People of Faith Against the Death Penalty is a grassroots effort that seeks to educate and mobilize faith communities to act to abolish the death penalty in North Carolina and the United States. They attempt to stay abreast of news and events concerning this issue. They avail themselves of opportunities to testify and advocate for inmates on death row, conduct vigils, and pursue a moratorium on executions.

Planned Parenthood of Central NC provides education programs, health care, and advocacy to help reduce unintended pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections, especially among teens, people with limited incomes, and the uninsured through offices in Chapel Hill and Durham.

Quaker Earthcare Witness (QEW) is a spiritually-centered movement of Quakers and like-minded people seeking ways to integrate concern for the environment with Friends' long-standing testimonies for simplicity, integrity, peace, and equality.

Quaker House was started when a soldier from Ft. Bragg traveled to the Chapel Hill Friends Meeting to ask for help. Beginning with support for dissident Gls protesting the Vietnam War, Quaker House is still supporting the troops through its Gl Rights Hotline, organizing peace actions, and serving as a bridge between the increasingly estranged military and civilian subcultures in America.

Right Sharing of World Resources (RSWR) is a Quaker organization that supports local initiatives for economic development in the "two-thirds" world. Grants are given of \$5,000 or less for start-up projects, which must become self-sustaining. RSWR also supports education work among Quakers by providing educational materials and sponsoring programs on simplicity and economic disparities between rich and poor countries.

Rural Southern Voices for Peace (RSVP) serves as the U.S. / International Listening Project Training and Resource Center. Listening Projects facilitate communication, understanding, and the empowerment of people and communities. They help organizations make significant progress in their efforts for justice, peace, the environment, health and community development. RSVP initiated the first Listening Project in 1985, and since then they have facilitated projects nationally and internationally on a wide range of progressive issues. They offer Listening Project resources, consultation, training and trainer referral and provide creative tools for nonviolent community organizing and education. In addition, RSVP provides training and resources in Facilitated Dialogue with groups of people.

L. Russell Herman, Jr. For A Social Action Fund Proposal Chapel Hill Friends Meeting, June 15, 2008

Russell Herman is a mediator, facilitator in challenging situations in a community or organization and is a trainer and coach for leaders and potential leaders in community organizing. He gives leaders tools to navigate that sometimes daunting world. He helps develop support networks with organizations with similar challenges and he follows up on his personal coaching as long as needed.

"Before we can create a peaceful and healthy world, we have to create the organizational tools necessary to guide society toward that goal. I work to create the tool of a statewide movement - a large network of activists and organizations (with formal and informal linkages) that see themselves as allies and cooperate on a shared strategy. That tool will help us guide our society." (L. Russell Herman)
