Update on CHFM 75th Anniversary Tapestry

What is it? A plan to create an embroidered wall panel illustrating events and outreach of CHFM since the beginning, made in the manner of the 77 panels of the original Quaker Tapestry.

Where is it? In the hopes, aspirations and fingers of a small group of dedicated CHFM sewers (aka the "Sowers").

How is it? The Sowers have met since January to immerse ourselves in QT lore. Each member is working on a small personal embroidery as an experiential intro to creating the larger tapestry. We have drawn on several sources in the meeting - committees, longtime member stories, FDS - for items for inclusion on the panel. The designers are discerning what to choose.

When is it - going to be started? In fall 2012 we hope to have a design on fabric.

What can I do for the Tapestry? Keep asking where it is! Join the Sowers! Commit to (at least) one stitch when the time comes! And accept our gratitude for your continuing support.

What else? We intend a fall forum to share the story so far. Our mentor in England, director of the QT, is excited by our progress. We have a contact in Willamette, Oregon, who has just finished 20 years of work on a tapestry for her meeting as part of the American Quaker Tapestry!

Article from *The Nation* about Quran Submitted by Marilyn Dyer

The July 2-9, 2012, issue of "The Nation" is largely given over to the growing problem of Islamophobia in America. In enlightened Chapel Hill we may not be aware of the degree to which Islamophobia is occurring elsewhere in America. The information in "The Nation" is alarming, and Friends need to read the special issue.

Some good news is to be had in the following article from the June 22, 2012, issue of "The Christian Century." One way we can help lessen tensions is to support efforts to "unlock" the Qur'an (as scholars in the West have so ably done with the Bible). We all need to know what is and isn't in the Qur'an as a means for reducing abuse of this holy book.

Progressive Muslims around the world will be deeply appreciative of the action initiated by the Society of Biblical Literature.

Bible scholars back more critical studies of Qur'an

The Society of Biblical Literature, the largest international body of scholars of the Hebrew Bible, the New Testament and related texts, hopes to assist experts on the Qur'an in creating an independent body for fostering research on Islam's holiest book.

The SBL announced May 29 that is was awarded a \$140,000 grant from the Henry Luce Foundation to provide travel expenses, meeting space and other assistance over a three-year period, allowing scholars to explore creation of such a network.

"It cannot be overstated that the agenda of the scholars in this consultation will not be directed by the SBL," said John Kutsko, executive director of the Atlanta-based biblical society. The guidelines aim to allow scholars "to use their own research and publishing agendas" that may transcend institutional and international lines, he said.

"The level of interest in the Qur'an and Islam in the West today is unprecedented," said Emran El-Badawi, assistant professor of Arab studies at the University of Houston and co-director of the consultation. Although a growing number of web-sites and online forums discuss the meaning and interpretation of the Qur'an, "no learned society dedicated to the study of the Qur'an exists," El-Badawi said.

The envisioned Society for Qur'anic Studies would encourage scholars of various perspectives to present "cutting edge research on the Qur'an's language, its dialogue with other scriptures, and the context in which the text arose," said the other co-director, Gabriel Said Reynolds, an associate professor of Islamic studies and theology at the University of Notre Dame.

"By approaching the Qur'an as a historical, literary and religious text," Reynolds said, the society will demonstrate the "wide-ranging scholarly value of the Qur'an."


The first formal meeting of the ten-member steering committee will take place in Chicago in mid-November during the annual meetings of the Society of Biblical Literature and the American Academy of Religion.
