## **CROP Walk Results**

Thanks to the contributions of so many people, our meeting raised a total of \$3,953 for IFC and the Church World Service. This amount includes \$3,528 from sponsorships of walkers; \$290 from the sale of 58 T-shirts, as well as \$135 in additional donations from people who purchased T-shirts. A special honorable mention goes to Gwynne Pomeroy. Though she had been away in California tending to family affairs, she signed up to walk on the day of the walk and still managed to raise \$180. Special thanks go to all our generous sponsors who supported the walkers.

Despite the rain, most of the walkers actually participated in the walk as well. **Minutes**

**Tom Munk, clerk; Robin Harper, recording clerk**

**Worship and query:** *How do I make my home a place of friendliness, peace, and renewal, where God is real for those who live there and those who visit?*

Friends spoke about their experiences of welcoming attenders to meeting for worship, and about the power of a loving embrace. Another spoke about the need to allow others to be welcoming. Graciously accepting hospitality is an act of love, as well.

**1. Welcome, recognition of first-time attenders, review of agenda**

We welcomed first-time attenders Martha Clark and Bruce Taylor.

**2. Review of minutes for March Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business**

*Approved.*

**3. Report from the Spiritual State of the Meeting Retreat—Dottie Heninger (Attached)**

*Accepted with gratitude.*

**4. Treasurer's Report—Matt Drake (Attached)**

Matt reminded us that this report is for the first 9 months of fiscal year, July 2013-March 2014. We are in good shape regarding contributions, and we will soon be paying out the remainder of our benevolences. In efforts to reach our budget goal, the Finance Committee has been encouraging Friends who have not yet given, reminding Friends who have not yet fulfilled their giving plans, and asking committee clerks to submit their expenses by mid-June. All of this tends toward starting the new fiscal year fresh. One Friend asked what happens if we exceed our contributions goal. In that case, two things can happen: the overage goes into our checking account to help with summer expenses when income is low, or some could go into renovations. It does not roll over into next year's budget.

*The report was accepted with appreciation.*

**5. Request for one-time donation to the Carolina Friends School's "Building Friends" capital campaign—Pat Mann, for the CHFM members of the CFS Board**

The request is for \$200 to be given to the school's current Building Friends capital campaign, and for the money to come from our Contingency Fund. Our Benevolence to CFS goes 100% to tuition, and this request does not affect that. This campaign is aimed at campus infrastructure and equipment. The goal of the capital campaign is close to \$7 million, and will be conducted over the course of a couple of years.

Friends asked about giving more than \$200. There is still \$875 out of \$1000 left in the Contingency Fund for this FY, so the money is there. The school is making major improvements to the facilities and we would like to be as generous as we can. However, it was pointed out that there is still power behind our merely symbolic support, for the community to know that both the CFHM and the Durham Friends Meeting are behind the campaign.

*After some discussion, Friends reached unity on the idea of giving \$500 now, then revisiting the issue again at the end of the fiscal year.*

## **6. Report from Piedmont Friends Fellowship—Jeff Brown**

In March, over 100 Friends gathered at the New Garden Friends Meeting for PFF's annual retreat. Program highlights included a renowned historical tour of the cemetery, a performance by "Granny D," and a Compassionate Listening workshop led by Jan Hutton.

California, Pennsylvania, is the setting for this year's Friends General Conference Gathering, June 29-July 5. To help more Friends attend, \$150/person is available in scholarship money from PFF. Work/study is also available at the gathering. This year's theme is "Love is the First Motion," serendipitously coinciding with our own.

Next year's gathering will be at Cullowhee, NC. PFF is requesting Friends from CHFM to serve on the Planning Committee. May 2-3 is the first meeting of this committee, in Asheville, and will be chaired by Joe and Terry Graedon of Durham Friends Meeting. Tom Munk and Jennifer Leeman will be serving, and urged others to join them. See Jeff for scholarship info or if you're interested in serving on the planning committee.

Yearly Meeting formation is proceeding well. All PFF members are asked to consider YM membership, and appoint representatives. The first meeting of PFYM reps will be held in September, and March 15, 2015, is the date of the first annual meeting. PFYM will be a separate entity from PFF.

Over the years we have been asked twice to consider yearly meeting membership but have not felt led to join. Tom proposed taking this issue to M&W again now, and asked for Friends' feelings surrounding yearly meeting membership. Questions were raised about what meetings are enthusiastic, which are reticent, and how many there are. Six groups, including Charlotte Monthly Meeting and other smaller worship groups, are interested. Membership in PFF has been declining in recent years, but there is new growth and interest, particularly with the growing interest of New Garden Friends. There were also many questions about what exactly is involved in yearly meeting membership, and we all felt we could benefit from more knowledge about the structure of yearly meetings in North Carolina.

James Harper offered to post a paragraph on the website, explaining the structure of yearly meetings in NC. Jeff will work with M&W to write this paragraph and begin creation of a diagram to illustrate it as well. Bill Schweke will help. Jeff also offered to make PFYM's vision statement available to Friends.

*As a MWAB, we are interested in exploring this issue, and we defer the question to M&W to consider and report back to us.*

## **7. Annual Report from the Buildings and Grounds Committee—Don Hopper (Attached)**

Appreciation was expressed for the quiet, invisible work that B&G does to make everything we do possible. Particular appreciation was expressed to Don, who is here a lot and does so much behind the scenes. We were charged to take on more ownership for this ourselves—it is not only the work of B&G, but all of us!

## **8. Peace & Justice Committee requests approval for Burma Shave-style message boards in front of Meetinghouse—Bill Jenkins**

First proposed signs would read:

*Peace is  
Alive and Well  
in Chapel Hill  
Your Friends, the Quakers*

P&J's proposal is to do this as a series of temporary signs, and then assess its success. They would like to post 4 to 6 sets of signs, over the next year. They would also like to include more of the youth in creation of the content. Bill assured us that placement of the signs will comply with Chapel Hill Town ordinances, and that all sign content will be approved at MWAB. He asked that recommendations for signs be sent to him, and also reminded us that P&J is an open committee, which all are welcome to attend.

*Friends approved the use of these signs.*

## 9. FCNL Priorities, from Peace & Justice Committee—Bill Jenkins

The Friends Committee on National Legislation polled meetings about their legislative priorities, and asked that they articulate them on a very short time frame. P&J responded to this request, and is now bringing the priorities to MWAB for our input. Here are the proposed priorities that P&J would like FCNL to focus on:

1. Reduce the influence of money in the political process. We support this as a top priority and request that special emphasis be placed on reducing the impact of ALEC and AIPAC through the development of model legislation at the federal and state levels on issues including health care, voting rights, and law enforcement.
2. Reduce U.S. military operations around the world with special emphasis on the elimination of drone attacks.
3. Promote capacity for peaceful prevention and resolution of deadly conflicts particularly in Afghanistan, Palestine/Israel, and Iran.
4. Reform drug policies, mass incarceration, and institutionalized racism.
5. Support progressive tax structures to address poverty and economic disparity.

Friends commented that at the federal level, it is important to think about not just reacting to proposed legislation, but to model our legislative priorities, and to do so in a positive way.

P&J welcomes Friends' feedback, and will publish the above priorities in the newsletter for Friends to ponder.

Bill also made us aware of two upcoming events. On May 14 or 19 there will be a Moral Monday event in Raleigh, followed by a meeting afterwards at Raleigh Friends Meeting. Later this summer, there will be a joint forum held with CHFM at the Durham Friends Meeting.

**Annual Spiritual State of the Meeting Report  
For the Chapel Hill Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends  
March 22, 2014**

We gathered to consider three queries developed by the Ministry and Worship Committee to focus on different dimensions of our Meeting life:

1. What do you look for at our meetings for worship?
2. What are you seeking in our Meeting community?
3. What do you think you bring to our meetings for worship and to our meeting community?

We were grateful for Lloyd Kramer's facilitation of our considerations as he divided us into small groups and led our general sessions. Twenty-four members and attenders joined in the morning's discernments and worship.

The last of our discussions summarized our perceptions of the spiritual state of our Meeting. We feel blessed that our spiritual state is vital and strong. It is based on our trust of the Meeting's abiding love and spiritual sharing which thrive in this community. We recognize the wisdom and hospitality of our departed members who nurtured us, and have faith that the leadership of our community will continue. We look for spiritual connections across the generations.

We expressed great appreciation for the children in our midst and the extraordinary, faithful First Day School teachers and children's religious education committee. The Orange County Correctional volunteers also do the work of our community and we are grateful for their gifts and dedication. Many of us also recognized our spiritual searches are becoming more inward. We are finding new interest in the Quaker peace testimony as it affects our inward, spiritual lives. While we are grateful for the variety of outreach activities in our community, we also find support in the encouragement our Meeting provides to seek our own spiritual paths.

We are connected to each other. This sacred commitment nurtures our spiritual lives – as a community and as individuals. One Friend spoke eloquently of Yeats' question "who can tell the dance from the dancers?" as a reflection of how our community and spiritual lives work together.

We yearn for deeper connections with each other and opportunities to share our spiritual lives. Small groups have been re-kindled and we hope that these will continue to thrive, bringing our community even more closely connected. We noted that we do not have many young adults or newcomers among us. We will hold these concerns and re-visit them throughout the year.

Our gathering ended with worship and gratitude for our Meeting and for each other.

**Annual Report of Building and Grounds Committee  
Chapel Hill Friends Meeting  
April 2014**

The B&G Committee currently includes as members: Jeff Brown, Bill Cleaver, Kathy Davis, Lynn Drake, John Hite (ex-officio), Don Hopper (clerk), Richard Miller, David Schneider, Tom Smith, Wendy Michener and Beth Kurtz Costes. Jeff's time has been compromised by his service on Care and Counsel whose meeting time conflicts with that of B&G. We miss some of his energy. Other than that, we have had a good year with all of the members serving and helping with tasks.

John Hite continues to serve as resident. He tends to take care of and coordinate requests for building use. He keeps B&G informed of issues concerning the care and maintenance of the buildings and grounds. John is a major benefit for B&G and the Meeting. We thank him for his efforts.

The renovation of the upstairs of the Meeting House has taken up a large share of the committee's attention this past year. After fine tuning the list of aspects of the proposed upstairs renovation, individuals of B&G went out to share those ideas with the other committees of the Meeting. With the insight and feedback from these meetings, B&G arranged with ARE to have a forum to present the proposal for renovations of the upstairs and outside entry of the Meeting House. This forum was followed a month later with a second forum to entertain and discuss questions and concerns of Meeting's members and attenders. Currently the committee is rehashing the costs of the projects and planning a presentation to Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business.

We are also planning for major renovations of the downstairs. Insulating the walls in the teen room and the middle room will continue the process of "sealing the envelope" of the Meeting House. This will entail the reconfiguration of the HVAC ductwork. At the same time we will update the electrical service to a 400amp capacity and bring the wiring up to date with code standards. We have added upgrading the kitchen and installing a washer/dryer machine. We now have pricing for nearly all of the project. We look forward to bringing this information to Business Meeting soon.

The Chapel Hill Mennonite Fellowship has grown and has moved their services to another location in town after leasing the Meeting House on Sunday evenings for the last few years. We part amicably.

Other tasks accomplished this past year:

- completed painting downstairs baths
- installed a "time capsule" and sealed the teen room fireplace
- arranged for 3 work mornings with various tasks accomplished
- added 2 leaf raking sessions at the rise of late Meeting, very successful
- repaired a couple of broken benches in Meeting Room
- unclogged downstairs kitchen sink drain
- added new door sweeps to front doors
- other routine tasks and maintenance, lawn care, carpet cleaning, replacing light bulbs, haggling with ATT about service contracts and billing, coordinating with Friends Early School on varied issues
- working with the Shotts family to improve the state of the memorial garden by adding landscape plantings and a new bench, and moving energy through the area
- considering options for more visible sign near parking lot entrance
