## **Building and Grounds Announcement**

#### MEETINGHOUSE LOWER LEVEL RENOVATIONS UNDER WAY! From the Buildings and Grounds Committee, June 22, 2017

#### **MAJOR POINTS:**

- 1. Renovations to the lower level of the meetinghouse by Trinity Design Build, Durham began on Monday, June 19 and will continue until completion.
- 2. The lower level of the meetinghouse **IS ACCESSIBLE ONLY** to the Design Build contractors and Don Hopper & Wendy Michener of Buildings & Grounds Committee.
- 3. The only toilet now available in the meetinghouse is the one in the foyer.
- 4. The playground is accessible only from the schoolhouse.
- 5. Meeting volunteers are opening and closing the meetinghouse and schoolhouse this summer while John Hite is away.
- 6. A dumpster, storage shed, and porta-potty will be on meetinghouse grounds throughout the renovations.
- 7. Your help with keeping the meetinghouse and schoolhouse clean and orderly throughout the renovations will be greatly appreciated.

#### **ADDITIONAL INFORMATION:**

- The Town of Chapel Hill Planning Department gave us the final permit to proceed with renovating the lower level of the meetinghouse in early June.
- John Hite will spend most of the summer in Europe. He has graciously planned his vacation around the renovation.
- Buildings & Grounds Committee members and other Meeting volunteers cleaned out the lower level over the last few months.
- The used furniture, appliances, and other salvageable items from downstairs were donated to TROSA.
- A construction fence has been erected to protect children on the playground and will stay in place throughout the renovation.
- The parking lot will be busy during the week with contractors' trucks and equipment. We expect the parking lot to be clear on Sunday mornings, most of the time.
- B&G has hired a cleaning company to do a weekly cleaning of the Meetinghouse and occasional cleaning of the schoolhouse during the summer.
- Toilets in the schoolhouse and the porta-john are available for our use.
- Hospitality will use disposable cups and plates in the library over the summer.
- Your patience and assistance are requested to reduce the disruptions during the renovations.

# 3. Proposed 2017-2018 budget - Asta Crowe, Finance Committee member, & Maura Murphy, Meeting Treasurer (ATTACHED)

Asta noted that the budget recommendation for 2017-18 is higher than it was for 2016-17, and so far we haven't quite met this year's budget. So Friends may need to reconsider their contributions if we are to meet next year's goal. We gave special thanks to Maura for being our Treasurer. She works very hard to manage the Meeting's finances.

# 4. Proposed 2017-2018 Nominations report - Ed Bowen, Co-clerk, Nominations Committee (ATTACHED) Several changes were requested from last month's document:

- Faye Stanley and Julia Cleaver will be joining the Carolina Friends School Board.
- Lori Fernald Khamala will become a CHFM representative to Piedmont Friends Fellowship. We are continuing to search for a third representative.
- The Archives Committee name list was wrong and has been corrected (Lloyd Kramer's name was added). Also the ex officio members of Archives were added, and P&C needs to determine their Archives rep.
- Karen Porter will be joining the Quaker House Board.
- Kathleen McNeil's name should be removed as a committee member from the C/YRE list. Her name should appear as the FDS Coordinator.
- Emily Buehler is stepping down from P&C; her name should be removed.

We approved the slate with the above corrections.

The Nominations Committee recommends that the Meeting consider three year terms (similar to committee members) for the Trustees, Corresponding Clerk, Treasurer, Recorder, Recording Clerk, and Meeting Clerk. It may be appropriate for the same people to serve many consecutive terms (especially in the case of Meeting Trustees). But they do see value in a term end date as it will enforce a check-in to determine if continued service is becoming an undue burden for the individual or is otherwise unwanted.

Several Friends noted that people who serve for multiple terms carry institutional memory of the committees, which is very important for the committees' work.

Trustee Asta Crowe agreed that the trustees need some guidelines and term limits but perhaps longer than three years. This would be good for the Trustees and the rest of us.

Our Clerk suggested that all of this needs to be worked on and considered.

We approved that the Clerk would investigate the best way to begin this work, and bring a proposal at a later date.

#### **5.** Publications & Communications Committee annual report – James Harper (ATTACHED) The report was accepted with thanks.

Gratitude was expressed by several Friends for James's work on the website in support of M&W's work, including Quakerism 101. Emily Buehler was also thanked for her 7+ years of producing the monthly newsletter.

# 6. Don Hopper, Clerk, Building & Grounds Committee – Announcement about upcoming renovations to the lower level of the meetinghouse and resulting changes during the renovations. Q & A.

Don gave us a run-down on the latest developments, and some things to be aware of in the months ahead:

- We now have our final permit to go ahead with the work.
- We have cleaned out the downstairs.
- A fence has been established to protect children throughout the construction. During construction, the playground will only be accessible via the schoolhouse.
- We will only have one bathroom in the Meetinghouse (upstairs) for next few months; others are available in the schoolhouse.
- The downstairs will not be accessible from upstairs, except via the elevator.
- Many things were salvaged and donated to TROSA.
- Richard Miller has lent us a storage shed for use during construction (located near street edge of property).
- John Hite will be spending most of the summer in Europe; he has graciously planned his vacation around our renovation.
- We should not have much difficulty with parking, but the early school may need to be flexible when school starts.
- Hospitality will be using disposable cups in the library over the summer.
- B&G has hired a cleaning company to do a weekly cleaning of the Meetinghouse during John's absence. We will be in disarray over the next few months and request your patience and assistance by making an extra effort to keep things clean and tidy during the two months or so of construction.

Sincere thanks were expressed to Don and the rest of the committee for their hard work and attention to detail.

# 7. Proposed minute in support of the 2018 Quaker Pilgrimage to the birthplace of the Religious Society of Friends - Lynn Drake, former Pilgrimage Planning Committee Member

Lynn read the proposed minute. There was discussion around the use of the word "pilgrimage," which connotes a journey to a sacred place. In keeping with our belief that all sites are sacred and all days are holy, we felt that calling the trip a pilgrimage was inappropriate. While we could not change the name of the trip, which is planned and led by others, we agreed to remove the word "pilgrimage" from our minute of support. The final minute is as follows:

"The Chapel Hill Friends Meeting wholeheartedly supports the next trip to historic Quaker sites in northern England sponsored by Carolina Friends School. The trip will be held July 22-29, 2018. Friends are encouraged to consider participating."

### Approved.

Lynn reported that 29 people went on the 2013 trip, including 11 from our Meeting. She provided contact info for those who are interested, and noted that some assistance funds are available from the Meeting.

#### 8. Naveed Moeed, Co-clerk, Peace & Justice Committee – Update on refugee family (ATTACHED)

Naveed shared the painful story of extended members of the Afghani family that we have been assisting. Thanks were expressed to Naveed for this update, and we returned to worship to hold these families and their supporters in our prayers.

#### 9. From Matt Drake, Clerk

A. Our approval of the NC WARN resolution last month was reported to them by Sally Robertson of NC WARN. Hank Elkins reported that the Orange County Board of Commissioners is considering signing onto the resolution as well, which calls for a ban on the use and import of fracked gas in NC. It will be an item on their agenda at their meeting on Tuesday, June 20<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 p.m., at the Southern Human Services Center, 2501 Homestead Road, in Chapel Hill.

#### STATEMENT ON HELPING AN AFGHANI REFUGEE Naveed Moeed, presenting to Meeting for Worship with Attention Business (6/18/17)

Chapel Hill Friends Meeting is currently supporting two refugee families, one Syrian and one Afghani. This month we have had the unexpected opportunity to support another Afghani family. The latter family are progressing well, with the children established in school and the mother now established in at work with Amazon. They are currently in the process to acquire green cards and the mother is looking to pass her driving test this year.

The core group raised funds privately (without the assistance of the meeting or any outside agency) to attempt a reunion with the mother and her sister. They have not seen each other in 10 years. 10 years ago, the sister went into hiding with her 2-hear-old son, after her husband was assassinated and achieved refugee status in 2010 in Canada. She has not seen any of her family since.

At the beginning of Ramadan (23<sup>rd</sup> of May), the sister arrived with her three children (her son now twelve and two young twins). There was a tearful reunion and much joy.

A week into her stay she was contacted by the Canadian Immigration authorities with regards to an issue regarding her immigration status (even though she has been there for 7 years). The issue was with regards to her second husband who she married on arriving in Canada. There are no children from this marriage. She was divorced from this man in 2015. The divorce was a traditional divorce in which no paperwork was involved and the male had only to declare "I divorce you" three times. "Talak, talak, talak".

As there was no paperwork around the divorce and she had since remarried the immigration authorities were querying her new marriage. She was demanded to return to Canada to resolve the situation and if possible provide a signed document from her ex-husband showing that she had divorced him.

In attempting to return to Canada, Air Canada refused the family boarding because they declared that for every child under the age of 2, there needed to be an adult aged 16 or over. Despite letting them travel to the US in this situation they would not let them leave. After critical negotiations with the travel agency, who were in error, we eventually managed to rebook them and acquire another ticket for a volunteer adult to travel with them.

We then needed to find a volunteer to travel to Regina, Saskatchewan and back to help the sister return with her children to Canada. Leslie Rountree and others stepped forward in a gesture of incredible generosity and offered their time. This was further complicated as the travel agency in question could not guarantee when the flight would be. Eventually on Tuesday 6 June, Leslie and the family departed for Canada and she delivered the family safely to their home in Regina.

Since then the sister has been in negotiations with the Canadian immigration authorities. We await further news.
