In September, Quaker House tabled at both the Mental Health Summit and the Special Victims Summit on Ft. Bragg, raising awareness of our Domestic Violence, Sexual Assault, and Moral Injury Counseling Program. Quaker House also attended a Domestic Violence Vigil, remembering the 77 people who died in domestic violence incidents in North Carolina in the past year. (cont'd p 4)

Library Committee Annual Report (2016-2017)

The Library Committee maintains and improves the Meeting's collection of library books, periodicals, pamphlets, and other resources to further the life of the Meeting and its participants. It annually reviews the collection and purchases new materials on its own initiative as well as considering requests from committees and individuals. It works particularly closely with the Ministry and Worship Committee and the two Religious Education committees. Attendance at committee meetings is open to all.

Highlights from the last year.

- 1. The library committee has continued to maintain the collection in Library Thing, our online guide accessible through the link on our web site, and we are working on ways to enter pamphlets and other publications that are not from Pendle Hill.
- 2. We purchased 15+ new books.
- 3. We added 25+ donated books to the collection.
- 4. We retired the computer that was in the library.
- 5. We have shifted the collection to make better use of space, and continue to clear nonlibrary material from the shelves.

Goals for the coming year.

- 1. Offer the accumulated books that we cannot use to the Meeting members, and donate books they do not want to the public library or Eno Friends Meeting of Hillsborough.
- 2. Go through the 2 boxes and 2 bags of books Marilyn Dyer has very graciously donated, and offer duplicates and others we cannot use to Eno Friends if they have a library.
- 3. See if we can obtain a computer/laptop/tablet for people to search LibraryThing while in the library for books they are interested in.
- 4. Try some options for the pamphlets that are not currently indexed so that they are more available to the Meeting.
- 5. Encourage Friends to help keep the library neat by not leaving miscellaneous items on the shelves and tables.

- 1. We opened with worship and the query "How am I a faithful steward of the environment?"
- 2. Minutes of the September 17, 2017 MWAB. The minutes were approved as written.

- 3. Highlights from the PFYM and the joint Piedmont Friends Fellowship (PFF) and Piedmont Friends Yearly Meeting (PFYM) Interim Meeting in August. Emilie Condon, CHFM Representative to PFYM, read the report (attached). Friends expressed appreciation to Emilie for representing us at PFYM. Two Friends reported that they attended the September PFF/PFYM retreat last month and their pleasure at joining with other Friends there. Matt reported that the Meeting Recorder and the Ministry & Worship Committee are collecting statistics on attendance for PFYM and will be providing PFYM a report from our upcoming spiritual state of the Meeting meeting.
- 4. Library Committee Annual Report. David Curtin, Committee Clerk, read the report (attached). Friends were enthusiastic about the online catalogue of the library's books and pamphlets. A friend offered a correction to the report, noting that we now have two rather than three, religious education committees since the youth and children's committees have combined. **The report was accepted with appreciation.**
- 5. Ministry and Worship Committee Annual Report. Jan Hutton, Committee Co-Clerk, read the report (attached). Friends expressed appreciation for the Clerks retreat and the Quakerism 101 sessions and the opportunity they provided for Friends to gather and deepen in their understanding of what it means to be part of the Quaker Community. Another Friend expressed appreciation for the committee's attention to the quality of worship. **The report was accepted with gratitude.**
- 6. **July-Sept 2017 budget report.** Maura Murphy, Treasurer, reported (attached). We are in great shape. We are at 16% of our annual budget, which is in line with other years' first quarter levels. Furthermore, committees are in line with projected spending. Although we are overspending revenue this year, this is due to renovation costs and is being covered by money raised for that purpose last year. Emilie Condon reported that the committee will soon be sending notices requesting that Friends let the Meeting know how much they plan to give this fiscal year. **The report was accepted with appreciation.**
- 7. Update on the renovations of the lower level of the meetinghouse. Wendy Michener, Building and Grounds Committee member, reported. We are about midway through the downstairs renovations. Drywall is being installed. Committee members will meet next week with an interior designer to choose paint colors. The current hope is that John Hite will be able to move back in December 2017. The next "moving in" priority will be the nursery. Appreciation was expressed for John continuing to serve us even though he is not currently living in the meeting house. Wendy noted that some tension exists on how the downstairs will be furnished. She suggested that Friends listen carefully and respectfully to each other as these decisions are made. Note also was made that the front door has a new lock. The new lock requires an intentional effort to lock the door each time you leave the building.
- 8. Recommendation of Lori Khamala to join the Hospitality Committee. Elizabeth Taylor, Nominations Committee member, brought forward the recommendation. **The Meeting approved the recommendation of Lori Khamala as a member of the Hospitality Committee**.
- 9. Meeting for Healing. Jennifer Leeman, Member of Care and Counsel Committee, reported that a Meeting for Healing will be held this coming Thursday to hold Cindy Bowen, Nate Schweke, their families, and others in the Light. We took time to hold Cindy and Nate and their families in the Light.
- 10. Report from Peace and Justice Committee. Hank Elkins, committee member, reported that Peace and Justice adopted a minute urging David Price to co-sponsor a resolution directing the President to remove the US Armed Forces from the Republic of Yemen (attached). Hank urged Friends to contact David Price directly.

Annual Report, Ministry and Worship Committee

October, 2017

Reviewing the activities of the Ministry and Worship Committee this past year, we celebrate the cooperation/collaboration with other Meeting committees, Meeting members and attenders, and others who inspire our work and service. Our responsibility is to support the spiritual life of the Meeting with concern for the quality of our Meetings for Worship and Meetings for Worship with Attention to Business, including a number of other roles, addressed below.

Recurring activities of Ministry and Worship include the Clerks' Retreat, the Spiritual State of the Meeting gathering, the Christmas eve service, Worship Sharing with Attention to Animals (guided by Robin Harper), Meeting for Worship with Attention to Graduating Seniors, Forums, discerning queries for each month of the year used in the e-news, newsletter, and read in the first part of Meeting for Worship, and participation on clearness committees for membership. Planning for the Clerks' Retreat involves working with the Clerk of the Meeting on the agenda and inviting ideas from Committee Clerks on topics of interest for the retreat and then learning about the discernment and spiritual opportunity of clerking a committee. Additionally, process documents relating to clerking were streamlined and revised for the retreat, and are available on the Meeting website. The Spiritual State of the Meeting allows us to reflect on issues through the lens of Piedmont Friends Yearly Meeting membership while sharing deeply with others on queries prompted by the Yearly Meeting; we felt grateful for the 30+ members and attenders who engaged, worshipfully, with each other, during the Spiritual State of the Meeting in October, 2016.

Also under the care of the Ministry and Worship Committee is updating clearness committee procedures and concerns with regard to membership. In our ongoing discussions of how to better serve clearness committees for membership, we discerned that a second meeting should always occur as it creates a greater sense of building community while offering an opportunity to get to know the Friend seeking membership. The following statement has been added to the membership page on our website: "It is recommended that the clearness committee will meet two or more times with the person requesting membership."

Continuing our ongoing threshing of Membership concerns, a familial membership task force has been formed, coordinated by M&W members Lynn Drake and Pam Schwingl, and joined by several others, including reps from Archives, and CYRE. This task force is gathering information from other Meetings to help discern the best policy to recommend for young adult Friends who have grown up in our Meeting.

Since our last annual report in October, 2016, we have had clearness committees for Karen Hurka-Richardson and the Meeting welcomed her into membership. A clearness committee for Evangeline Rioux has also been completed and her membership approved.

We serve on other clearness committees with members of Care and Counsel and share the oversight of occasional Meetings for Healing. The Ministry and Worship Committee offered a November 2016 Forum entitled, "How do we listen to the different ways people express faith in meeting for worship?" Lynn Drake and Jan Hutton, members of the Ministry and Worship Committee, offered a 4-session, two hours each, Quakerism 101 in early 2017. We were pleased to welcome members of the Carolina Friends School community to Quakerism 101, as well. We thank Publication and Communications Committee members Sean Chen and James Harper for posting a link to the articles and videos from all four sessions on our website. In responding to an expressed spiritual need, our Committee planned and offered a silent contemplative retreat in April 2017, which we anticipate will now become an annual event. Participants shared how they felt lifted up by this opportunity to go deep in the silence. We continue to work with Children's and Youth Religious Education Committee to have the teens close late Meeting during the months with five Sundays, and are grateful for the opportunity to include our young Friends in worship.

Some of the continuing concerns of the Ministry and Worship Committee include: the quality of our vocal ministry; cell phone noise in Meeting for Worship; our Committee responsibilities of nurturing other committees; and balancing the length of our very important announcements at the close of late Meeting with the need for brevity.

Friend Seeks Housing for 1-Week Stints in Late Fall/Early Winter Dear Friends.

I am a final semester UNC Master of Social Work student and member of Ann Arbor MI Friends Meeting, but sojourning at the Chapel Hill Friends Meeting until I complete my MSW. I'm also working on a Certificate in International Peace and Conflict Resolution, and I'm just finishing up my final grad school requirements and wrapping up details. I've had a difficult time finding sustainable housing solutions for the last few months I'm here (I anticipate until January). I had a renting plan fall through and then experienced a housing environment that was feeling unsafe, and I'm working hard on the challenge of finding something that is both nourishing and available for only a few months. My preferred idea for handling this challenge is I'm reaching out to Quakers (Friends) and friends to see if several households would be willing to host me for approximately one week stints between now and January. I'm tidy, fairly evenly balanced between quiet and friendly, I like to cook and would like to share with you, and, like most Quakers I enjoy reflective conversation that challenges me to a better way of life. I'm 30, female, and bring along only a small amount of stuff. The weeks I'm seeking housing for are as follows:

Oct 29-Nov 4; Nov 4-11; Nov 11-17; Nov 25-Dec 2; Dec 2-9; or any stint of time between Dec 27 and January.

Please let me know if any of these appeal to you, or a different set of dates, or if you have different ideas. I'm hoping to meet this challenge in a way that helps me meet and get to know lots of friends and Friends more deeply (and vice versa), keeps me light on my feet, helps me stretch my financial resources to match the challenge of finishing grad school, and feels doable to everyone involved. Please reach out and let me know if you are interested in supporting this goal.

Proposal to Establish a Google Group for the Peace and Justice Committee

Hank Elkins October 15, 2017

I propose establishing a Google Group to facilitate communications within our Peace and Justice Committee.

A Google Group would have the following advantages for conducting our committee business:

- <u>Centralizes all committee business in one central location</u>: We will be able to find committee messages sent on different dates without the clutter of hundreds of other email messages. There will be no need to search our email messages by using the name of the sender or topic.
- Maintains topic threads: Messages for a given topic can be maintained as a single thread.
- <u>Keeps the existing address for outside communications</u>: Establishing a Google Group would not replace the existing facility for communicating via <u>peaceandjustice@chapelhillfriends.org</u>. That functioning address would still serve the Committee, particularly for receiving messages originating from outside the Committee.
- Messages arrive as regular email: Committee messages posted in the Google group arrive in members' regular email account as normal email messages. Therefore there is no need to access the Google group to see whether or not a message has been posted. The arrival of the message serves as an alert.
- The Committee clerk or group manager can easily and quickly add or remove group members without intervention: The appointed manager of the Google group can add or remove group members throughout the year without bothering the publications committee.
- There is no need for a member to create a new account: Since the group manager adds or removes names of group members, no group member has the chore of having to create an account.
- The list of group members is transparent and readily available: The names of those in the Google group are accessible without having to ask Publications to send a list.
- All members can be given privileges of both posting and receiving: Unless there is a reason to restrict privileges, all members can be granted posting privileges so long as they have a Google email account. Anyone without a Google email account can obtain a free Google account. Anyone choosing not to have a Google account can receive messages.
- Google Group is free: Creating and using a Google group is absolutely free.
- <u>Large files are possible</u>: Files, even large files up to 25 megabytes, can be attached to Google group messages.
- **No space limitation**: There is no space limitation for posts and attached files and no charge for additional space use as the number of messages grows.
- Google group does not conflict with and in fact facilitates archiving: Essential Committee
 business is easily accessible in one central location and can be transferred to another location for
 archiving without arduous searching.
