Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business (MWAB) 20 May, 2018

- 1. We opened with worship and the query: "How do I present a loving example to others when faced with conflict?"
- 2. We welcomed two first time attenders. Matt introduced Riley Robinson who is traveling to Meetings on behalf of the Friends Committee for National Legislation. We also welcomed Jake Kost.

3. Maura Murphy, Treasurer, presented the proposed 2018-2019 budget on behalf of the Finance Committee (attached). She noted that the committee has taken a new approach to setting committee budgets for the year. Because of an historic tendency for committees to ask for more than they actually spent, Finance asked committees to look at their past year's spending as an initial guide to how much they will need for the coming year. As a result of this new approach, next year's proposed budget is almost \$3,000 less than the prior year. We held approval of the budget over for final consideration at the June MWAB.

4. The minutes of the April 15, 2018 were accepted as printed in the newsletter.

- 5. Don Hopper, Committee Clerk, requested approval for Buildings and Grounds Committee's recommendation that we build a dedicated ADA compliant parking space and create a wheelchair appropriate sidewalk from it to the meetinghouse. This work can be done this summer at a cost of \$4,741. Approval for this work is being requested separately from paving the parking lot because the two jobs involve different contractors and need to be performed independently. The Meeting approved building a dedicated ADA compliant parking space and creating a wheelchair appropriate sidewalk from it to the meetinghouse with the work to be done this summer at a cost of \$4,741, and with the funds to come from the Meeting's reserves.
- 6. Hank Elkins, Committee Member, presented Peace and Justice Committee's recommendations for the Meeting's 2017-2018 benevolences, totaling \$24,420 to 15 benevolences (attached). Matt reminded the Meeting that Tom Munk presented a full overview of the process that resulted in the selection of these benevolences, in addition to the list of benevolences, at last month's MWAB with the decision to approve held over until this month. Benevolences were selected on the criteria of "Quaker-affiliated or local organizations that reflect our Meeting's values and with which members of the Meeting are closely involved." Lloyd Kramer spoke as a member of the adhoc group that discerned the final list, noting that there are many worthy organizations and therefore it is important to apply criteria to discern the ones our Meeting will support. We approved the fifteen recommended 2017-2018 Meeting Peace and Justice Committee recommended benevolences totaling \$24,420 with thanks to Peace and Justice and the individuals who served on the adhoc committee. Richard Miller reported that he is assembling a binder of materials related to each benevolence to be kept in the library. He asked that Friends share materials they have about the benevolences and he will include them in the binder.
- 7. Don Hopper, Committee Clerk, requested approval for Buildings and Grounds Committee's recommendation for the following improvements to the meeting room: that we remove the carpet and pad, clean and repair the subfloor, remove the corner air duct, remove the ceiling tiles, and "fair up" the remaining ceiling sheetrock in June. This work would be done by members of the Buildings and Grounds Committee and other Meeting volunteers with professional assistance on the subfloor repair. Don provided a sample of what the initial flooring will look like. The costs are estimated to be about \$1,500 and will be covered by the renovations fund. We will then worship in an unfinished meeting room for the next several months while we come to unity on and install a finished ceiling and floor. The work may or may not involve moving the benches and chairs to the schoolhouse and holding Meeting for Worship in the schoolhouse during the project. We approved the recommendation to remove the meeting room carpet and pad, clean and repair the subfloor, remove the corner air duct, remove the ceiling tiles, and "fair up" the remaining ceiling sheetrock in June at a cost of approximately \$1,500 with appreciation to Don Hopper and the Buildings and Grounds Committee. Tom McQuiston, whose professional career involved worker safety, emphasized the importance of assuring the safety of volunteers involved in removing the ceiling tiles.
- 8. Gwynne Pomeroy, Committee Co-clerk, presented Nominations Committee's recommended list of Meeting officers, appointees, and committee members (see attached). Friends suggested corrections to the report, which Gwynne will incorporate into the list to be presented next month for final consideration at the June MWAB. Gwynne noted that vacancies still need to be filled for Quaker House, Finance, and Publications and Communications. Friends thanked Gwynne and the committee for their excellent work.
- 9. Matt Drake reported that Claire Bates received the award of a Clarence and Lilly Pickett Endowment for Quaker Leadership grant and recommend approval of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOA) between Chapel Hill Friends Meeting and Claire Bates regarding administration of the grant. The MOA notes that "The purpose of the Pickett

Endowment grant to Claire is for the research, development, and piloting of a dialogue method bringing together war-impacted people (refugees, military veterans and families, concerned community members, and peace activists) to learn from one another's experiences and develop together informed and engaged antiwar activism efforts." The MOA includes a Care & Counsel support committee for Claire whose members are Jan Hutton, Curt Torell, Tom Ludlow, Alice Carlton, Dave Curtin, and Claire's sister, Elizabeth. The MOA also describes the Finance Committee's administration of the grant with disbursement and accounting by the Meeting Treasurer, Maura Murphy, working with the project treasurer, Tom Ludlow. Gratitude was expressed to Tom Ludlow for orchestrating the specifics of the MOU and management of the award. We celebrated the award of the Clarence and Lilly Pickett Endowment for Quaker Leadership grant to Claire Bates and approved the Memorandum of Understanding between our Meeting and Claire regarding administration of the grant.

- 10. Don Hopper, Committee Clerk, presented the Building and Grounds Committee's recommendation that we resurface and re-stripe the parking lot this summer in partnership with Carolina Friends School (CFS) at a cost to the Meeting of \$7,250. The project is expected to take three days. Following questions raised when this was presented last month, Hank Elkins and Don Hopper researched the possibility of installing a semi-pervious surface, including Don calling the individual responsible for the semi-pervious surface at the Botanical Garden. They learned that when a lot's grade is over 5%, semi-pervious surfaces are problematic. We have about 13% grade, which makes a semi-pervious surface unfeasible. A Friend raised a question about the existing drainage, which will be discussed further in Buildings and Grounds. Another Friend suggested we re-look at the 50% to 50% sharing maintaining the parking lot with the Friends School, given the fact that we charge them minimal rent. Friends approved re-surfacing and restriping the parking lot with asphalt in partnership with Carolina Friends School this summer for \$14,500, with us paying 50% and CFS paying 50%. We also approved having Finance Committee start a discussion about our contract with CFS in preparation for its renewal in four years.
- 11. Jan Hutton, Committee Co-clerk, presented the Ministry and Worship Committee's recommendation for the following benevolences for 2017-2018: \$600 for Friends General Conference (FGC), \$150 for Friends Journal and \$50 for QuakerSpeak, \$350 for Piedmont Friends Fellowship (PFF)/Piedmont Friends Yearly Meeting (PFYM), \$150 for School of the Spirit, and \$100 for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Queer Friends Concerns (FLGBTQ –C). The Meeting approved Ministry and Worship's recommended benevolences totaling \$1,400 for 2017-2018.
- 12. Curt Torell, proposed two minutes in support of Casey Webber (attached), a young man who grew up in our Meeting who is potentially facing decades in prison on felony charges for planning and being present at protests on the Inauguration Day of Donald Trump. The trial is currently under way. Tom Munk will serve as a character witness for Casey. The minutes will be sent to Casey's lawyer and to Tom Munk with the hope that they can use them to make a case for Casey's long history of working for peace within the bounds of the law. *Consider.* The Meeting approved the two minutes and approved sending them to Casey's defense attorney and to Tom Munk for whatever use they may make of them.
- 13. Matt called attention to the forums, Casey's trial, and FGC Summer Gathering announcements listed in the agenda.
- 14. We closed with worship.
