- 2. We welcomed first time attender, Gregory Hawkins, and reviewed the agenda.
- 3. We approved last month's minutes as written.
- 4. Don Hopper, Clerk of the Building and Grounds Committee presented an update on the renovations of the meeting room. Brad Redfoot, general contractor of Redfoot & Weber Construction Company, recommended installing additional ceiling beams to support the HVAC. Obtaining town permits is in process. All this will increase costs by \$11,000-\$15,000. Carolina Friends School will re-roof the school house during spring break. We accepted Don's report with appreciation.
- 5.A. Jan Hutton, Clerk of the Ministry and Worship Committee, presented a recommendation that Naomi Latisha Crites, daughter of Savannah Crites and Lolly Dunlap, be approved as a familial member of Meeting. We approved this recommendation.
- B. Piedmont Friends Fellowship and Yearly Meeting retreat will be on April 19-21. Ministry and Worship recommends we change Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business (MWAB) from Sunday April 21 at 9 am to 7 pm, Thursday April 18, 2019 in order to encourage full participation in the retreat. We approved this change. Tom Munk will organize volunteers to drive those who are uncomfortable driving at night.
- 6. Matt has received an email from Friendship Meeting confirming the transfer of membership of Lori Fernald Khamala and Imani Elizabeth Fernald Khamala from Friendship Meeting in Greensboro to Chapel Hill Friends Meeting. - B. Hank Elkins presented the recommendation for the 2018-2019 Meeting benevolences. (See appendix 4.) We will hold this item over to decide at our April MWAB.
- C. Tom Munk gave an update on the March 15 lobby visit to Washington, DC with Friends Committee on National Legislation (FCNL). Concerns related to Yemen, Venezuela, and the Authorization for Use of Military Force (AUMF) were discussed with staff of our representatives to congress with the presence of FCNL staff. We accepted the update with gratitude.
- D. Tom Munk presented the Piedmont Friends Yearly Meeting (PFYM) proposal to establish a Friends Committee on North Carolina Legislation (FCNCL) as an organization under the spiritual care of PFYM. The Peace & Justice Committee recommended we approve the establishment of FCNCL. We approved this recommendation.

Appendix 1

Hospitality Committee Annual Report 2019 Chapel Hill Friends Meeting

The Hospitality Committee strives to make visitors feel welcomed and to foster community within the meeting. Specifically, the Committee serves to:

- greet attenders and welcome visitors to meeting
- manage monthly potluck
- organize a Thanksgiving event
- assist CYRE with the mid-December Christmas party
- help finding volunteers to provide meals for Friends in temporary need

Greet attenders and welcome visitors to meeting: At 11 o'clock worship attenders are greeted and visitors are welcomed with an introductory brochure and invited to sign the guest book to receive (thanks, particularly, to the efforts of Annalee Harkins) an invitation to learn more about our meeting and/or to be added to the listsery. We continue to host fellowship after worship where we can further welcome visitors and where all attenders can connect with each other. And we strive to provide quality refreshments to make fellowship more convivial.

This year the Committee authored a document of guidance for greeters and invited other members of the meeting to act as greeter (with the Committee providing refreshments). The document has proved particularly useful in clarifying when to ring the bell for worship.

We also instituted, and are working out the kinks of, a new name tag system (special thanks to Lori Khamala). In place of an impenetrable tangle of strings we are using detachable badges that can clip directly to clothing or to a separate neck lanyard. The schoolhouse is proving to be unpropitious for instituting a new system and we are looking to make further improvements once back in the Meeting House.

Manage monthly potluck: The Committee purchases supplies, sets up and cleans up (with much appreciated help from non-committee members), and generally oversees potluck. A major innovation this year is the use of compostable plates. With them we can:

- allow Hospitality members to focus on welcoming visitors rather than washing dishes (Nancy Fisher can even sit down to eat)
- compost food waste and paper napkins -- both of which were discarded before
- allay some concerns about the sanitariness of our previous method of hand-washing
- possibly (according to one study) consume less energy than by heating water for handwashing

Organize a Thanksgiving event: For two years running, the Committee has asked for volunteers to share their Thanksgiving dinner with members without a local family to be with. This year we had no volunteer hosts and two would-be guests who fortunately found other venues for Thanksgiving. The year before we had neither hosts nor guests. Next Thanksgiving we will need to rethink our plans.

Assist CYRE with the mid-December Christmas party: Committee members help with set-up and cleanup, and the Committee provides paper plates, napkins, egg nog, hot cider, and table decorations for the Christmas potluck (special thanks to the departing clerk, Joanna Selim, for providing the new clerk a detailed list of what to buy). The party was definitely a lot of fun.

Help finding volunteers to provide meals for Friends in temporary need: In January of 2018 the Hospitality Committee (through the efforts of Annalee) established a group on the Lotsa Helping Hands website for members who want to be contacted when a member of the meeting informs Care and Counsel that the member needs a meal because of some incapacity. Although the Lotsa Helping Hands group now exists, it has not yet been tested in use. There is some concern that there are not enough people in the group to ensure that someone is able to provide a meal when needed and we are considering ways to expand our list of potential volunteers.

Appendix 2

Transition and Support Committee
Annual Report
April 2018 to April 2019
Presented March 17, 2019 in MWAB

This report covers our activities as we continue to serve men in Orange Correctional Center (OCC) as well as those whom we support when they return to the Chapel Hill community.

- Yokefellows at OCC on Tuesdays: We go to the prison to be with the men at the Peace Center, attending Tuesday night meetings of Yokefellows three times per month. While Yokefellows discontinued the practice of serving snacks at these meetings, we find we now have more time for extended conversations with the men at our tables.
- Other involvement in OCC events: We continue to attend and support various events at OCC such as Parents Day, Black History celebration (now an annual event), and special meals for Fourth of July and Thanksgiving. We will host a birthday party on August 27 for men whose birthdays fall in that month, and all are invited.
- Extra Support at OCC: Bonnie Raphael and Maria Darlington tutor men who are taking classes. Asta Crow assisted with the Pre-release course for men within a year to eighteen months of leaving OCC. Paul Munk and Richard Miller continue to take several men who plan to live in this area to addiction recovery meetings in town. Several former inmates also attend these Monday night meetings. This year Bonnie Raphael assisted one of the men in getting his life sentence reviewed by the Innocence Project at Wake Forest Law School; as a result of the Project's work, we are hopeful that there will be a change in his incarceration.
- Meeting for Worship at OCC: We had two meetings for worship last year at Orange
 Correctional Center and have meetings for worship scheduled this year for Sunday, March 24
 and Sunday, August 11 at 7 pm; Friends should arrive by 6:40 pm. Let us know if you would like
 to join us.
- OCC residents and returning citizens in Meeting for Worship at CHFM: We bring OCC residents to join us here at the Meeting. Men from our Committee to serve as sponsors, bringing 1-3 men to Meeting for Worship, forums, and potluck. We also encourage former OCC residents

who have returning to the community to join us, sometimes providing transportation. In our experience of our Committee, these men have become an integral part of our worship, and other members of the Meeting appreciate their participation. When it is not potluck Sunday, we go out together for lunch after Meeting.

- Current residents, returning citizens and T&S Discussion after potluck: Following potluck
 each month we gather with current OCC residents, returning citizens and members of the
 committee and the Meeting at large for discussion of issues of interest and concern for the
 group. The insights of returning citizens have been useful for men planning their housing,
 employment, transportation and other details of their next steps after release and for us in our
 support of both groups. We understand that these gatherings and the Tuesday night Yokefellow
 meetings are helping the men break barriers among them in the prison.
- book Club: Our Crossing the Fenceline Book Club offers another opportunity for Friends to get to know the men from OCC. Led by Tom McQuiston, Nancy Fisher, and Richard Miller, eight to nine men from the prison join other Committee members in the discussions. Multiple copies of the books are provided by local libraries. This year the group read *Grapes of Wrath*, *The Namesake*, Just Like *Us*, *Death with Interruptions*, *The Sound and the Fury*, *The Book of Joy*, *The Great Influenza*, *The Warmth of Other Suns*, *The Spirit Catches You and You Fall Down*, and *Nineteen-Eighty-Four*. We are currently reading *The Turner House*. In the past year Edward Harris has been the OCC internal coordinator for distribution of the books, and Gregory Hawkins now taken on that role. One of the guards was recently observed reading our newest book. The Book Club now meets at Fly Leaf Book Store after the 11 am Meeting for Worship on the last First Day of the month.
- Support Teams with Returning citizens: Since March 2016 TSC teams have provided support for 17 returning citizens, and we continue to enjoy friendship with and support of a number of these men. This year we have supported 4 men in their return to this community and reinitiated assistance to two men who have returning to IFC Community House. Through the work of Nancy Fisher and others we've developed a relationship with the Inter-Faith Council Community House that has facilitated the admission of men directly from OCC. When returning citizens are released, our support circles of 2-3 people assist them in obtaining necessary clothing from socks to winter coats, transportation to Social Security and government agencies, medical appointments, and job interviews. When more permanent housing is located, we assist in locating and providing furnishings; on rare occasion, members have assisted with expenses in coordination with the Returning Citizens Financial Assistance Committee. Beyond this logistical support, relationship building is the greater part of our effort. Upon the occasion of re-arrest of a returning citizen, we provide support as circumstances indicate. Most of our time and energy goes to building friendships and offering support over coffee or meals.
- Annual Picnic: This year we held our second annual Reunion Picnic at Southern Community Park in September, inviting 60 men with whom we have worked over the past several years. There were many we couldn't locate, but about 40 returning citizens came with wives, children, grandchildren, and a few pets. Our group pictures show that we had a good time. There was lots of hugging. We will repeat this event in the fall. Friends are invited.
- Returning Citizen Support Groups: In addition, there are now two gatherings where some of the returning citizens are meeting in friendship and support of each other. Tom McQuiston has organized group for returning citizens who also work with young people in the community, and a friend who returning recently also hosts a group.
- **T&S Committee operation**: Finally, our Committee meets the last Tuesday of the month to coordinate support for individuals and to coordinate our interaction with other organizations and programs. We are currently developing a profile of re-entry programs and housing programs in the Chapel Hill and Durham area that might serve returning citizens that we support.

Our committee membership has remained stable this year and includes Asta Crowe, Maria Darlington, Hank Elkins, Timothy Fogarty, Nancy Fisher, Kuldip Kuwahara, Tom McQuiston, Richard Miller (clerk for 2018), Joyce Munk, Paul Munk, Bonnie Raphael, David Schneider, Monteze Snyder (current clerk), and Byron Stevens.

Appendix 3

Chapel Hill Friends Meeting—Peace & Justice Committee Annual Report—March 17, 2019

Since our last report, in March of 2018, the Peace & Justice Committee has been busy. Each month, this committee conducts informative, and at times spirited discussions of the many peace and justice activities of the Meeting and of individual Friends. This report highlights only some of these activities, which are too numerous to report in full.

Benevolences: Using the process approved by the Meeting for Worship, we have recommended funding for selected benevolences in a separate report. We give special thanks to the Benevolences Subcommittee, comprising Hank Elkins (clerk), Linda Drake, John Hite, and Karen Porter, and ask Friends to consider whether they may be led to participate on this subcommittee next year.

War in Yemen: Tom has coordinated Friends' lobbying efforts to cease U.S. unauthorized hostilities in the Saudi-led war on the Republic of Yemen, which has resulted in the worst humanitarian disaster of recent times. Efforts over the past year, as well as ongoing (and current) efforts have included lobbying U.S. Rep. David Price, as well as U.S. Senators Burr and Tillis.

Justice United: The Meeting continues to be actively engaged in the work of Orange County Justice United's efforts. Representatives of the constituent organizations continue to focus on immigration, jobs, and housing as ongoing priorities. Jim and Hank represent Peace & Justice for Justice United and inform the committee of activities on an ongoing basis. For example, the Justice United Housing Action Team presented a Master Leasing Proposal for affordable housing to the Orange County Housing Advisory Board. As another example, the Orange County School Board has committed to recruiting 141 minority teachers over the next five years. Additionally, Justice United has engaged in immigration lobbying for immigrants under the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program. Tim, Ronald Carnes, and Jim attended a three-day training.

Veterans of 1960s Civil Rights Forum: Wendy organized this forum, which featured several Friends who had been activists in the 1960s era and afterward.

Sanctuary: Peace & Justice has continued its support of Sanctuary efforts undertaken by the Church of the Reconciliation (Presbyterian) and the Mennonite Church. Reconciliation has sheltered an immigrant on its premises for almost a year; and several Friends have volunteered in this effort, including Tim, Karen, and Leslie Rountree. Lori Fernald-Khamala has been involved in statewide sanctuary efforts on behalf of the

American Friends Service Committee (AFSC). Lori and Karen, along with Beth Welton of Reconciliation, conducted a forum on Sanctuary.

Quaker House: Curt Torell, Quaker House Treasurer, reported that Quaker House will produce two videos for its 50th anniversary this year; and the celebration will occur next fall in Fayetteville, along with local programs at various meetings.

Nonviolent Communication Workshops: These workshops were a great success, and some Friends continue to improve their Nonviolent Communication skills in the Meeting using the Quaker Social Change Ministry process. Wendy has been active in this area.

American Friends Service Committee (AFSC) General Secretary Visit: Naveed kept Peace & Justice informed about AFSC General Secretary Joyce Ajlouny's visit to the area, which had a two-fold purpose: (A) To educate and involve this area with AFSC's work and (B) to discuss needed funding cooperation.

Bolivian Teacher: Hank kept Peace & Justice informed of details involving a Bolivian teacher arriving to teach at Carolina Friends School this year.

Ruth Zalph's Four Arrests Protesting Kavanaugh U.S. Supreme Court Confirmation: Peace & Justice strongly supported Ruth's heroic efforts in this regard and agreed that Friends can contribute informally to her \$200 in legal expenses as individuals, as well as spread the word that others might wish to do so as they are led.

Casey Webber and Freedom of Speech: Casey, a graduate of our first-day school program whose principled efforts in protest to address the injustices that Quakers deplore, resulted in an unfair felony charge of riot (ultimately dropped). Peace & Justice monitored this situation, encouraging Friends to continue voicing support for Casey throughout the year. Casey may present a forum later this year.
