Gun Give Back, Sept. 14

On Saturday, September 14th from 2-4 pm, a gun giveback program will be held by a private citizen in the parking lot of the Community Church of Chapel Hill at 106 Purefoy Road, Chapel Hill. The Stuart and Cindy Good Memorial Fund and anonymous individuals have made the Gun Give Back event possible by generously donating funds necessary for this event. Your gun will be cut up with a chop saw on site. It will then be taken to a recyclery that week where the gun will be melted down and the material will be recycled.

To ensure safety, please do the following:

- Make sure that the gun is not loaded and does not have bullets in any chamber or magazine. Ammunition cannot be taken at the Gun Give Back event.
- Have all guns placed in your trunk or rear storage of your vehicle.
- When you arrive at the parking lot, open up the trunk or rear storage area.
- Trained security personnel will take the gun out, check its serial number, and take the gun.
- On the following Monday, gun pieces will be taken to a recyclery and the metal will be melted.

Quaker House 50th Anniversary Celebration Luncheon, Sept. 21

This year marks the 50th Anniversary of Quaker House. Fifty years ago Dean Holland, a Vietnam era soldier, hitched-hiked to Chapel Hill Friends Meeting and asked for help in getting a conscientious objector discharge from the military. After his plea and questions by our meeting, he proclaimed, "Quakers need to be in Fayetteville." At that, Bob Gwyn and others from our meeting, as well as other local meetings, formed Quaker House. CHFM has been a prominent supporter of this Quaker witness for peace ever since.

In honor of this anniversary, Quaker House is sponsoring a Celebration Luncheon on **Saturday, September 21, 11:30 AM to 1:30 PM**, at the Fayetteville Holiday Inn I-95 (1944 Cedar Creek Road). The celebration will feature a panel of those who have benefited from Quaker House, past and present directors, and our GI Rights Hotline and Domestic Violence counselors; a feature presentation by Monisha Rios, a military sexual assault survivor who Quaker House helped; the debut of newly made Quaker House films "Conscientious Peacemaking Since 1969" and "Stories of Gratitude;" live music; and food!

Getting tickets in advance is encouraged to help estimate attendance, but they will also be available at the door. Prices are \$0-\$10 for Limited Income; \$25 for Actual Cost; \$50+ Contribution Level; and free for service members and veterans.

ENDING ENDLESS WAR - This is an important time to contact Rep. Price, Senator Tillis, and Senator Burr in the cause of peace. Congress has made first steps to take war-making powers back from the President. The Constitution placed war-making powers in the hands of Congress, not the president. The 1973 War Powers Act -- passed over President Nixon's veto -- clarified that fact. These remain in effect, but the "War on Terror" changed the legal terrain. The 2001 Authorization for the Use of Military Force gave the president advance permission to use military force against anyone who planned, authorized, committed, or aided the 9/11 attacks, or who harbored such groups. This meant the Taliban and al-Qaeda in Afghanistan. Since then, three administrations have interpreted it to include more than half a dozen groups around the world. The 2002 AUMF authorized the 2003 invasion of Iraq to "defend the national security of the United States against the continuing threat posed by Iraq." The Trump administration now claims this authority for war against ISIS in Iraq, Syria, and elsewhere.

We have a chance to end these endless wars. All three of NC's Democratic Representatives cosponsored H.R. 1274 (Repeal 2001 AUMF), just days after our meetings with Price and Butterfield. Even more promising, the language of the resolution is included in the House version of the must-pass Defense Appropriations spending bill.

H.R. 2456 (Repeal 2002 Iraq AUMF) is a newer bill. It currently has co-sponsors, but its text has been included in the House version of another must-pass piece of legislation: the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA).

The legislative action is now in a House-Senate conference committee. FCNL and your CHFM Advocacy Team ask you to

- thank Rep. Price or Butterfield for co-sponsoring H.R. 1274. (202) 224-3121
- ask Rep. Price or Butterfield to co-sponsor H.R. 2456. (202) 224-3121
- ask Rep. Price or Butterfield to encourage Adam Smith, chair of the House Armed Services Committee, to retain the 2002 Iraq AUMF repeal in the NDAA. (202) 224-3121
- Senator Tillis will probably be a conferee for the National Defense Authorization Act, and shares our concerns about overreaching presidential power. Ask him to retain the 2002 Iraq AUFM repeal in the NDAA. 202-224-6342
