Asta Crowe shares with Friends:

This presentation will focus on the program Success While in Transition (SWIT), an organization established to assist formerly incarcerated individuals as they transition from prison to society.

The panelists, William (Mecca) Elmore, Tommy Green, Edward Scott, who have served 25–30 years in prison, will share their experiences and will discuss the tools and support needed for success, as well as the consequent reduction in the rate of recidivism.

All three individuals work closely with the NC Dept. of Public Safety, local law enforcement, mental health agencies, and community leaders. Business Meeting Minutes

- 1. Ann Miller as Clerk opened the meeting with worship and then read the month's Query: How do I share my spiritual life with others?
- 2. The Clerk welcomed Friends and reviewed the agenda. There were no first-time attenders
- 3. The Clerk presented the Minutes of the January 2025 Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business (MWAB). They were considered and approved.
- 4. The Clerk reported that the Naming Committee, which has been engaged in finding a new member for Nominations Committee, has not identified anyone willing to come forth. The Nominations Committee has determined they have enough people for this year's work but notes that we can expect to have several seats to fill next year.
- 5. David Waterman spoke for the Finance committee to ensure that Friends are aware that we can include the meeting in your bequest plans. There are useful documents on the <u>Donate</u> page of our website, and Finance Committee members and our Treasurer are happy to answer questions.
- 6. The Clerk reported that Friends General Conference has joined a multifaith coalition group in litigation to oppose the recission of the ICE sensitive location policy. With

discussion and appreciation for what an extraordinary step this is for FGC to take, Friends decided to send a minute of support. Hart Pillow will draft the minute and bring it to our next MWAB.

7. Susan Inglis reported for Nominations committee. The committee brought forth Linda MacKichan to serve on the Finance committee, beginning immediately. She has experience with finance through various boards she has served on and is a long-time Quaker. Friends approved her joining the committee.

She noted that our Nominations committee has begun the season's work. The committee reminds Friends that all the work of our Meeting is accomplished by committees and that there are over 20 opportunities for service.

This year opportunities include: Carolina Friends School Board (1 seat), Coalition of Clergy (1 seat), Adult Religious Education (at least 1 seat), Buildings & Grounds (1 seat), Care & Counsel (2 seats), Children & Youth Religious Education (2 seats), Finance (2 seats), Hospitality (at least 1 seat), Inter-Faith Council (2 seats), Library (2 seat), Ministry & Worship (1 seat), Peace & Justice (at least 3 seats)

Out of threshing sessions and prayerful discussion with Ministry & Worship and Care & Counsel Committees, the committee returns to our practice of expecting Friends to rotate off a committee after 2 consecutive terms. The practice is held to ensure that all Friends have the opportunity to make acquaintance with all committees that interest them. Committees with meetings open to all CHFM members and attenders include Peace and Justice and Inter-Faith Council. All committees are described on our website, and all follow the customary deliberation and decision-making process in the manner of Friends.

The Peace & Justice Committee is working on a new vision. Here are the points in their current draft:

1. It will be a space to nurture clearness and provide support for Friends' activity regarding peace and social justice.

2. It welcomes friends who want to better understand how aspects of social injustice and violence affect others and themselves.

3. With the participation of friends who are linked to other peace and social justice groups, it will explore and recommend ways CHFM might support and connect with these groups.

4. When led by the Spirit, it will draft statements of conscience and intent for consideration by CHFM Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business.

5. Based upon, and leading from, CHFM statements of conscience, the Committee will propose action for the CHFM and/or individuals to take.

Any Friend interested in committee service should speak to a member of the Nominations Committee: Susan Inglis, John Hite, Alice Carlton, Emilie Condon, Matt Drake, Lori Khamala, Quaker Harmon.

8. Wendy Michener for Peace & Justice committee brought a request that the meeting sign letters to our Senators Tillis and Budd and Representative Foushee asking them to

support legislation restoring the funding for the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East (UNRWA). Friends supported the request. With discussion, it was decided that the letters will be edited by Tom Munk, Curt Torell, Wendy Michener, then sent to Ann Miller for signature and sending to the legislators. The letter to Foushee will add appreciation for support last year and request she co-sponsor legislation in the House. Final letters will be shared via In The Light, and sent to legislators both by email and USPS.

- 9. The Clerk requested Friends' consider members for the Benevolence subcommittee for this year. Friends were reminded of the criteria for selection of organizations and the spirit of the previously approved Benevolence Minute (2020-21) which specifies a simplified, and focused process that allows us to move away from the often competitive, and divisive process". With discussion, Jeff Brown and Dottie Heninger were approved to serve as the Benevolences sub-committee. They will report to MWAB next month. Friend reminded us that though it is not easy to choose, we will trust this subcommittee to bring us a good list.
- 10. Clerk called for other concerns of members. None were brought, but Friends expressed appreciation for our community and our way of working together

11. Clerk noted that out next Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business is planned for 9:00 AM on 3/16/2025.
